## Activities on the HF Bands

Ed, 4L4FN, works at the U.N. World Food Program in North Korea and has tried for over two years to get permission to operate ham radio. Finally in mid November, he was given verbal permission to bring his Icom 706 Mark 2G into the country and to operate. He made a 20 meter dipole that tunes on 10. Ed is now awaiting written permission and this will be required before the ARRL can give credit for the QSO. It's not known how long that will take, although they have told him it should be around Christmas. Hopefully the active date will be back dated to November, otherwise, all these contacts will have to be made again after the effective date of the written license. Although Ed is working with the WFP up to 12 a day, he will try to be

on as much as possible. Remember, he is not a DXpedition and will not be on the air around the clock for three weeks. Friends will try to post his operating schedule at <http://www.amsatnet.com>, on the ARRL website, and the DX lists.

Please keep in mind that many people would like to work Ed for their last DXCC country. Be kind and patient and he will try to work everyone as long as permission to operate continues. Presently, Ed only has SSB and prefers 14.205 and 28.575 MHz. Weekdays 1400z-1500z and 2200z-2300z. Weekends more operating time is available to him. All operations will be split, listening up 5-15 KHz. He did not have a key when he first came up in November, and although he tried tapping 2 wires together, it was not a pretty picture. Around the Holidays he will be going home for a short vacation, and return with his keyer, a PSK232 modem, and maybe a few other items. This will allow him to do some digital modes as well. He is going to build a small beam for 10m and 20m to hopefully help his signal. QSL via KK5DO, Bruce Paige, PO Box 310, Alief, TX 77411. Include appropriate envelope and postage for the return of the card to you.

Members of the Royal Amateur Society of Thailand (RAST) have obtained permission to operate from Tarutao Island (AS-126) in December. The group expects to be QRV as E29AL from December 8 to 15. Team members include HS0GBI, HS1CKC, E21EIC, E20NTS, HS0/G3NOM, E20RRW, HS0XNO, HS4BPQ, E20HHK, HS9EQY and HS0ZCW (K4VUD). Look for them on the normal IOTA frequencies and on RTTY on 14086, 21086 and 28086, on PSK31 on 14070, 21070 and 28070 on SSTV on 14230, 21340 and 28680. On the low bands they will try 1834 and 3524. QSL via HS0GBI, Cherdchai Yiwlek, P.O. Box 1090, Kasetsart, Bangkok 10903, THAILAND.

Mark Haynes, M0DXR, informed the DX community that he has recently established a group of DXers which consists of members of the younger generation. The group is named the "Crystal Clear DX Group". They plan to undertake a DXpedition to the Maldives in August 2002. The team will consist of five to six operators with 3 stations on air for as much time as propagation will allow. The group has 3 main objectives:

- 1) To promote DXpedition and HF DXing for the younger generation and encourage similar future operations.
- 2) To show that a group of youngsters are capable of setting up and running a DXpedition to the point where it is recognized for its quality.
- 3) To concentrate on those stations who need 8Q7 as a new country on various band/mode slots. They plan to make at least 30,000 QSOs!

The team includes Tony/EA2AIJ, Simon/M0CLW, Fabian/DJ1YFK, Mark/M0DXR, and one more youngster from the UK. Activity will be on all bands including the WARC bands. However, since most of the members on the team are still full time students in education, they are currently looking for assistance, contributions to help with their finances and sponsoring. Chris Post,N3SIG, a Firefighter/EMT in the United States Antarctic Program at the McMurdo Station on Ross Island in Antarctica (IOTA AN-Ø11), is now active as KC4/N3SIG until March 2002. He informs OPDX that he will be active (usually) every other day starting around Ø1ØØ-Ø2ØØz. His main mode of operation is phone on 20/18/15 meters. Look for him on 14243 kHz to start. Special QSOs can be arranged by sending an E-mail to the following address: n3sig@arrl.net. All QSL cards go to AI3D, please include a SASE.

And speaking of Antarctica, Skip,WBØBBE is again operating KC4AAA. This is his third tour at the South Pole where he does communication-engineering duties along with part time hamming. The station can usually be found on 14243 from ØØØØ to Ø4ØØz plus or minus work schedules and propagation. QSL with SASE via K1IED. At least one ham will be part of the next over-wintering team at Russia's Antarctic Base Vostok, which uses the callsign R1ANC. Alex,RA1PC will keep the station active and Alan,UA1PAC might be there as well. And finally, reports indicate that SANAE, (the South African Base in the Antartic) ZS7ANT, is back on the air with a new operator Anton,ZS4AGA, who will stay there until February 2002. Plans are in the works to organize a traffic-like net for those interested in WABA (Worked All Antarctic Bases). Other stations to look for from the Antarctic Continent are CE9NKR, CE9MFJ, EM1HO, EM1KCC, KC4USA and VKØKMT.

The Hamilton Amateur Radio Club in Hamilton, New Zealand, has applied for and been given the callsign ZL6JAM for use during and after the "16th New Zealand Scout Jamboree" at Mystery Creek Hamilton from December 29th to January 6, 2002. The station will be active from the site from 2ØØØ-Ø5ØØz during this period, and outside these hours if possible. As this station is being set up for Scouts (both boys and girls aged 11 to 16), these kids would love to talk to kids around their own age, as well as Hams from around the world. The frequencies planned are: 3593, 3677, 7075 and 14260 kHz. They will be as near as possible to those frequencies. Operation on 15m and 10m will depend on conditions. A special QSL card is being printed for the Jamboree. QSL details are direct with 1 IRC or 1 USD to: ZL6JAM, P O Box 606, Hamilton, New Zealand. Please include an addressed envelope with direct QSL applications. No postage or greenstamps are required.

Attention Stamp Collectors! Carlos,CU3FT now active as 4W/CU3FT in East Timor, as been heard in the last few weeks on 12 and 14 meters. Carlos's QSL Manager Jose,CT1EEB, announced that QSLs for 4W/CU3FT have been arriving at his postal box at a rate of 4 to 5 a day. QSLs are not ready yet, as they are waiting for word from their sponsors and and the QSL sketch. Meanwhile, you can send your card via CT1EEB: Jose Emanuel Ribeiro de Sa, P.O. Box 79, 3860 Estarreja, Portugal. If you collect mail stamps you can request your card directly from Carlos in East-Timor (UNTAET mail stamps will be issued once full independence is achieved next May 2002), Carlos's direct address in East-Timor is: Carlos Poinho, Apartado 93, Dili, Timor-Leste / East-Timor.

Paolo,I2UIY has announced that a Website has been created to support the upcoming DXpedition to Niger that will take place in January/February 2002. The address is: <http://www.qsl.net/niger-2002>. On the Web page there is survey for the DX community to fill out to help them determine what bands/modes are needed. Additional information will be uploaded as soon as they get things finalized. Exact dates and callsigns will be announced shortly.

Leo,K8PYD and Jon,WB8YJF leaving on December 1st for the Austral Islands. They expect to arrive on December 3rd, and will leave on December 14th. They should be active all days inclusive December 3-14th. Operation will be mostly RTTY and some CW (Leo states maybe he will take a mic also if any room is available) on 80-10 meters. Jon Severt, WB8YJF, will use the callsign FOØSEV and Leo Fry, K8PYD, has the callsign FOØFRY. All cards are to be sent to the home callsigns. They hope to provide a new one for a few that still may need the Australs on RTTY.

Bill,W7TVF will be operating from Western Samoa until December 10th. He will be operating from the Kitano Tusitala Hotel and hopes to put up a big vertical antenna in the courtyard. His activity will be on 160-6 meters, mostly on CW. Special attention will be given to Europe and Africa during their low band grayline openings. Bill will be trying to provide an online log search that can be accessed daily. More details will be forthcoming. Also, watch the Web page at: <http://www.air-internet.com/~w7tvf>

Take, JI3DST will be active as JI3DST/3 from Miyako Island (AS-079) from December 29 to January 5. He plans to be QRV on 6, 10, 12, 15, 17 and 40 meters SSB. QSL via JI3DST either via the bureau or direct to 2-18-26 Hannan-cho, Abono-ku, Osaka-city, Osaka 545-0021, JAPAN.

Due to security reasons (prevailing military action in the West Bank) the planned activity of Guenter, E4/OE1GZA out of Ramallah for the CQ WW SSB Contest had to unfortunately be cancelled. Guenter's E4-activity will resume after the situation in the West Bank calms down (hopefully by the time you read this). Keep an eye on his URL at <http://sites.netscape.net/vr2gz/amateurradioe4> for details and periodical updates. QSLs requests for previous operations of E4/OE1GZA in 2000 and 2001 should go direct via P.O. Box 1133, Ramallah, Palestine for all who need a QSL fast. Cards received via bureau will take an extensive period to respond.

Sierra Leone now has another active Amateur Radio operator. Polish operator Zbyszek (Zbig) Belchacz, SP7BTB, part of the UN Assistance Mission in Sierra Leone (UNAMSIL), was recently issued the call 9L1BTB. He will be operating from Freetown for about 10 months using a Barrett radio running 120 watts and a multi-band dipole. So far he has been active on 10, 15 and 20 meters SSB. He expects to be on all bands from 10 to 80 meters. Zbig will be going back to Poland for a Christmas holiday. When he goes back to Sierra Leone he will take more antennas. For the time being, look for him on the high end of the 20 meter phone band. Check between 14252 and 14280 from 183Ø to 22ØØz. QSL via SP7CDG.

Hiroo, XWØX/JA2EZD, has a new 70 foot tower and Kenwood TL-922 amplifier at his office station in downtown Vientiane, Laos. He plans to use this very soon on the low bands. Hiroo is currently on 6, 10, 15, 20 and 40 meters. He hopes to be on the WARC bands very soon. JA7MYQ recently donated a RTTY system, and he should be operating on this mode by now. Hiroo also reports that Italian operators Mauro, IN3QBR and Fabrizio, IN3ZNR are heading back to Southeast Asia next spring. The two have received a license to operate from Laos for a 2 month period between March 22 and May 20. More details to follow on this one.

Hiroo has stated that sending US dollars to Laos is not a good idea. He says, "It is not a violation to possess US dollars, however the average postman in Laos makes about \$17 a month. The temptation is very high to take these envelopes. He asks that you please send IRCs. QSL XWØX via Hiroo Yonezuka, P.O. Box 2659 Vientiane, Laos.

Bill Moore, NC1L, the ARRL DXCC Manager, reports OJØVR and HK5QGX/0M operations have been approved for DXCC credit. The documentation has been reviewed and they are now OK. Anyone who has submitted them and had them rejected can contact DXCC to have their record updated without having to re-submit the card(s). Otherwise, they can be included with the next submission.

German operators Rudi, DL7VFR, and Tom, DL2RUM, have rescheduled their trip to Midway Island for March 2002. The two had originally planned an operation in late September of this year but had to cancel at the last minute. They now expect to operate from this Pacific island between March 10 and 23 of next year. They will use KH4/homecalls on 6-160 meters on CW, SSB and RTTY. Tom has a web page at <http://www.qsl.net/dl2rum/>, which is not up-to-date. QSLs go via their home calls.

Members of the Diamond DX Club will be heading to Sonsorol Island (OC-NEW), Belau early next year. The group was originally scheduled to go this month, however their trip was postponed due to the WTC disaster. Team members include Nando, IT9YRE; Maury, IZ1CRR, and Erminio, IZ8AJQ. They will use T88SI mostly on 10, 15 and 20 meters SSB from February 9 to 11. Financial support is being requested. Check out the web-site at <http://www.425dxn.org/dxped/t88si/> for complete details. QSL via IT9YRE, Ferdinando Rubino, P.O. Box 30, 96012 Avola SR, ITALY.

A new website has info on an upcoming DXpedition to Niger scheduled to happen in January and February next year. The webpage is [www.qsl.net/niger-2002](http://www.qsl.net/niger-2002). There is a survey to let the ops know which bands and modes are most needed. Exact dates and callsigns will be announced shortly.

The Belgian telecom authorities have issued this special prefix in celebration of the birth of "Princess Elisabeth". The permission to use this prefix runs until December 31st.

Charlotte, KQ1F/5H1F and Paul, K1XM/5H1X, may show up between now and December 10 from various locations in Tanzania, operating portable. All QSLs go to KQ1F.

Clemens, DL2GAN informed the DX community that he will be in the Seychelles until December 5. Look for S79GAN to be QRV on 10-40 meters CW and SSB. He'll be using a FT-7B with 50 watts along with multi-band dipoles and verticals. QSL to his home call.



Today his home shack is based around a Kenwood TS-570D driving an Ameritron 811 amplifier. His antenna farm consists of a Gap vertical and a Force 12 three-element beam on the roof. For two meters, he relies on a Motorola GM 300 driving a homemade five-element two meter yagi in his attic. "I built that out of a QST article. I really like putting stuff together, whether it's an antenna, a rig or a microphone for a friend."

He says he does most of his operating from his mobile setup – a Yaesu FT 100 and an ATLAS 100 motorized antenna. "I have more time to get on the air when I'm out running around than when I'm at home," he says.

Chris joined WCRA a couple of years ago, and last year was elected vice president. He says he enjoys being involved in the club and meeting other hams.

"The people I meet in the club keep me interested and give me the chance to try new things," he says. "There is so much to try – new equipment, new circuits, new modes. I don't think anyone could do it all unless they were at it full time. What really impresses me is getting on a new mode like PSK and talking to an 80-year-old guy who is running new modes and doing a good job of it. There are people who have been playing with this stuff for 50 or 60 years and are still building things and experimenting."

Chris says he enjoys operating mainly on 40 meters and 20 meters, both sideband and CW. He dabbles with the digital modes and when the bands are open he "likes 10 meters a lot."

He thinks his next challenge may be getting into ATV on 440. At last year's Field Day Chris impressed many visitors with an ATV equipped remote control car. "I'm an experimenter more than anything else, and there's plenty in this hobby to try."
