



Silent Key: Wayne Kiser KF9JC



HOWARD WAYNE KISER KF9JC
May 19th, 1939- August 17th, 2013.

Howard Wayne Kiser known to his friends as Wayne died August 17th, 2013 in Traverse City Michigan from complications from Parkinson's disease.

Kiser was born May 19th, 1939 in Springfield IL to Russell and Dorothy Kiser. He grew up in

the Detroit area until he moved to Traverse City with his family. His is a graduate of Traverse City Central High, earned his B.A. at Grace College in Winona Lake Indiana, and a MBA from Wheaton College in Wheaton IL. At the age of 25 he became the pastor of Zion Bethel Church, an independent church in Monticello, Indiana. Two new aspects of the church's outreach became a weekly column he wrote for the local paper and weekly club meetings for the church and community youth. The clubs were part of Pioneer Girls and Christian Service Brigade, and as a Brigade leader he took boys to summer camp and wrote stories for the leader' magazine. The people at camp knew of his writing and for several years talked to him about joining the Brigade editorial staff in Wheaton, IL. After five years at Zion Bethel he and his family moved to Illinois to become the managing editor of the Brigade Leader. He edited that magazine then moved onto to other editorial positions before he and his wife, Ruth

Ann, started a family business, Graphic and Editorial Services. For over 35 years they and later their son, Tim, produced printed material mostly for colleges, missions, and churches. Over the years Mr. Kiser served as a supply or interim pastor for churches that needed temporary help. He was also an adjunct professor at Moody Bible Institute and Wheaton College Graduate School.

Kiser is the author of several books, including one published by Broadman Press and one by Scripture Press. Another interest was amateur radio. He achieved in amateur radio, a radio class extra, that led to one of his favorite activities. He volunteered with the DuPage County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) and often coordinated communication between DuPage and surrounding counties during storm emergencies. In addition, he started a chaplaincy program for OEM. After he and his wife Ruth Ann retired and moved to back to Traverse City in 2009 he joined the chaplaincy program of the Grand Traverse Metro Department and helped plan two national conventions. He was a former president of the Wheaton Community Radio Amateur Club and served two terms as club president. As a member of the Studebaker Driver's Club he produced a monthly newsletter.

Wayne Kiser is survived by his wife of 55 years Ruth Ann and their children Dr. Daniel Wayne Kiser (Ruth), Debra Jean Gunther and Timothy David Kiser (Kim), as well as a sister Carol and a brother Russell Lee (Judy) and his brother-in-law Gordon Fischer.



More remembrances of Wayne KF9JC

Two -term President of the WCRA, Wayne Kiser, KF9JC, had a long career as a Publisher, Preacher, and long time service to the Ham Radio and Emergency Service community. He died on Saturday, August 17th in Traverse City, Michigan. His funeral services were held on Tuesday, August 20th.

Wayne was a resident of Glen Ellyn until several years ago when he retired to the Traverse City area. Wayne's work on the Weather Net and his Chaplaincy Program at OEM were outstanding, and he was a cheerful volunteer for any task. Wayne's time of presidency of the WCRA was noted for its efficient administration and cooperative efforts by the Board and Members. What only a few club members knew were the details of his multi - talented professional life.

When I looked for a publisher of a magazine which I edited, I found Wayne; he did the job with competence, complete with his own printing press! If I needed spiritual guidance, Wayne was a solid source of advice. He was an ordained minister and had been the

Editor and Publisher of many religious magazines. I was able to talk to Wayne about driving my Studebaker President, Lark and Daytona in the sixties because Wayne had been the publisher of the Studebaker Owners magazine.

Wayne's proudest achievement was his establishing a Chaplaincy at the Office of Homeland Security and OEM. He realized the Emergency Victims as well as the staff serving in an emergency situation needed counseling and he provided for it. My appreciation for Wayne's support was never greater than when he arrived with the OHS-OEM group at my late wife's visitation to offer a prayer of consolation.

When the effects of Parkinson's disease began to take its toll on Wayne, he had to slow down and retire to his home town of Traverse City to be with his family. With the help of his supportive wife, Ruth Ann, he joined the local emergency unit and the local church. I asked Ruth Ann if she had a word to pass on to Wayne's friends. She said: "Tell them that knowing God is directing makes a world of difference when things are tough."



"Radio Scouting this Fall"

This fall we will focus on getting scouts interested in amateur radio through the radio scouting initiative. We'll do this by guiding them along a pathway that builds on their experiences and leverages organized scouting activities that integrate ham radio. In late October we will setup a Jamboree On The Air (JOTA) station at Blackwell Forest Preserve. Scouts from several troops and packs will be attending a Chanonee District open house where we will be setup with Troop 35 of Wheaton. At the event we will help scouts connect with others around the world and promote our other events along the pathway.

In early November we will sponsor a Radio Merit badge class for 25 scouts in Wheaton. The merit badge will focus on the ham radio requirements. The class will be 5 hours long and the scouts will be getting a taste of ham radio practice and theory. At this event we will promote the upcoming Hamfest and technician license class in the first quarter of 2014.

We are also looking into providing a fun "you build it" corner at the Hamfest for youth. An electronics project that is simple and low cost and can be built in about 30 minutes is what we are looking for. Our goal is to get youth excited about electronics and generate interest in our upcoming technician license class.


